From the Principal

Dear Parents and Families

We are rapidly coming to the end of Term 1. I have been very impressed with the students and their engagement with their learning. This week, teachers have met with the Head of Department to plan units of work for next term. The planning is embedded in the mandated curriculum that balances content knowledge and information with the general capabilities (skills and processes). These capabilities are the dispositions to learning.

We talk about students being researchers, thinker, collaborators, communicators, contributors and self-managers. When talking to your child/ren about their day at school, ask them if they were contributors or researchers or any of the assets. Using the language across school and home is important.



Positive Behaviour for Learning

The focus this week is on being responsible and being a learner. You can see the connections between our curriculum and PBL. These lessons are taught explicitly each week and discussed at assembly.



Parents as Partners



Serious about Maths and seriously fun

Hands-on mathematics inquiry involves actively engaging students in exploring mathematical concepts through manipulation, experimentation, and discovery. This approach encourages students to become active participants in their learning.

One of the primary benefits of hands-on mathematics inquiry is its ability to promote deeper understanding. When students actively manipulate objects and experiment with mathematical concepts, they develop a stronger grasp of the underlying principles.

At Ascot we have a particular focus this year on strengthening mathematical reasoning as well as increasing the opportunities for students to use hands on materials to explore concepts and demonstrate their understanding.

Here are some creative examples from Prep D students who were given loose parts materials to create their own number lines. The task demonstrates students number and numeral knowledge as well as their skills with sequencing numbers to 10 and beyond. What's more they had a serious amount of fun doing it.







Year 6 have been learning about tesselations, and worked on many hands on examples in groups, before creating their own.



Inquiry

How can inquiry nurture skills and dispositions for lifelong learning?

This is a question that was posed to our staff at a recent staff meeting.

I recently attended, with our Year 6 teaching team, the 'Future Anything Activate' workshop for teachers. Our learning partner Nicole Dyson, hosted this workshop and we look forward to working with Nicole and her Future Anything team later in the year, when our Year 6 students engage with their entrepreneurial market day project. At this workshop, we had the pleasure in listening to Jan Owen, CEO of the Foundation for Young Australians. Jan spoke about the importance of ensuring young Australians have the skills and experience for the jobs of the future. Employers want to know that young people have a raft of capabilities that they value, with capabilities such as creative thinking and analytical

thinking vital for current and emerging roles. These are the top 10 skills on the rise:

These skills are taught at Ascot through the Australian Curriculum General Capabilities.



Our students also use the language of the 'Learning Assets'. These 'assets' describe the broad skills that are commonly required by the inquirer and learning in general: a researcher, a collaborator, a thinker, a self-manager, a communicator and a contributor.

As a collaborator, students are engaging in skills such as turn taking, sharing, compromising, negotiating and encouraging others.

As a **self-manger**, students are developing skills such as persistence, risk taking, being focussed, planning and organising their work.

As a communicator, students are consciously considering skills such as using eye contact, being aware of their body language, audience, volume, tone and engaging with others.

When thinking, students are asking questions, innovating, evaluating, reflecting, making connections, predicting and empathising with others.

Researching is an important skill. Students are required to be able to understand primary and secondary sources, know the difference between fact and opinion, determine trustworthy sources, skim and scan text in order to find, sort and organise information and to engage with child friendly search browsers.

Many of our students use the language of 'learning assets' to set and reflect on their own learning goals.

We continue to focus our attention to the 'how' and 'why' we learn – across the curriculum, in school and beyond, alongside the content or product of learning.


